elaborate. We started in January and only had around three months to start making props, learn lines, learn cues and get everything ready for March 10th and 11th.

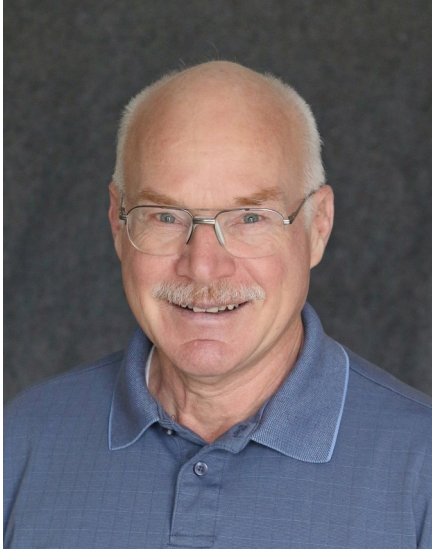
We had well over about 300 people in the audience combined over the two nights that we did the production. The thing

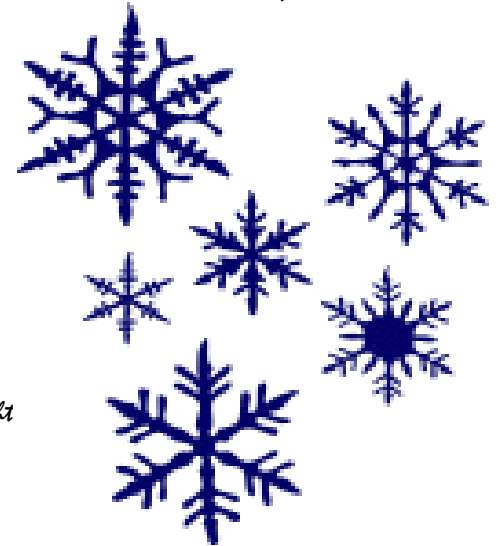
Snow Day

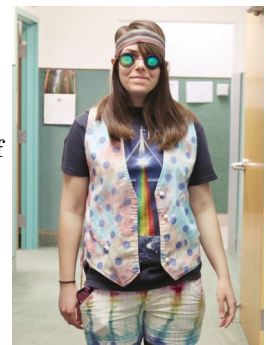
Character Day- Wednesday was character day and a few people dressed up. Zeke won the day dressed up as Clark Kent/Superman. After school was a game day which included

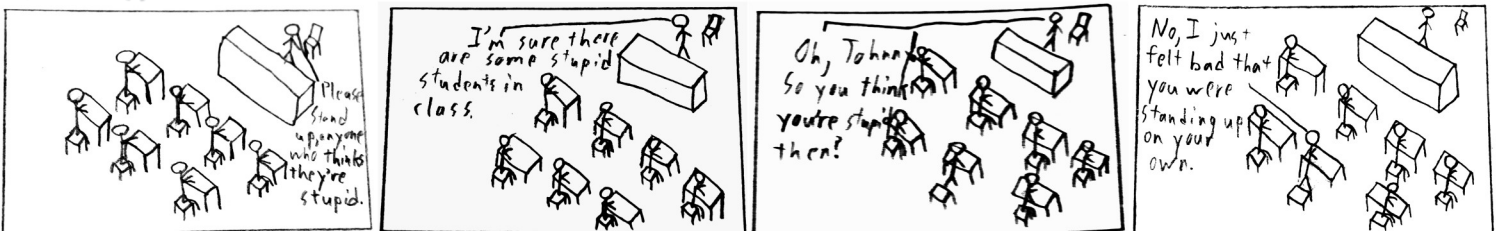
