We then headed back to Phoenix, where we had to wait a little longer, and then we headed back to Salt Lake. ## Native American Presentation -

On May 17th, as part of a Native American Cultural Awareness presentation, a couple of Native Americans came to visit us and show us a bit of what they do in their culture, which was, in this case, Hoop Dancing, drums, and the flute.

Their names were Jered Canty and Joseph Secody (JC and Joe). JC was the one to do the drums, and Joe was the one who danced with his hoops, as well as entertain us with his Navajo double flute when he wasn't wowing us with his skills on the floor. With his hoops, he made many figures - mainly animals such as butterflies, eagles, cowboys, and there were some where people saw different things in the same figure. Near the end, we learned that Joe had competed in the National Hoop Dancing competition last year, and he ranked in the top ten in the world, which is pretty amazing since a lot of people participate in this Hoop Dancing competition. He says he's planning on participating in the Hoop Dancing competition again next year, as well as trying out for a spot on America's Got Talent.

As well as seeing the things they did, they also told us about their cultures- what these dances mean to them, the clothing (called regalia, not costume), and a bit about their own lives.

Many of their dances are ceremonial, which they don't really dance for in public. Others - like the one Joe danced - are more for the public, but don't lose their significance. They say that every dance to them has a meaning - a purpose - whether that is for healing or celebration. The hoops Joe used - 14 of them -

were a bit more flashy than some, but it was interesting to learn what the patterns symbolized. The hoop itself represents life as a full circle, and four patterned markings signify the main life stages of birth, childhood, adulthood, and old age.

The regalia Joe wore were very bright, and many of us assumed it was just a costume. Joe explained that costumes are what you wear when you are pretending to be something you're not. He and other Native Americans take great pride in their regalia, which represents who they are. He said that he himself, friends, and family all sew and handmake their regalia, and it isn't something you can just buy at the local Walmart.
We also learned that JC, Joe, and others own a business in Page, Arizona. There, they're all about dancing, storytelling, flute music, traditional songs, and so much more that they show people who visit the Lake Powell and Page area. Their business is called Yellow World Production, and if you ever find yourself in Arizona or the Lake Powell area, visit them and see for yourselves what they can do.

## Choir and Orchestra Region - bi Ampre noxnous

On April 4th, 2017, the students of EskDale High School's choir and orchestra traveled to Tintic High School to participate in this year's Choir and Orchestra Regional Competition.

Our high school acquired a superior rating in our choir pieces. Though the choir can perform a myriad of songs, the ones sung at region included Bring Me Little Water, Silvy by Ledbetter/Gilpin, For the Beauty of the Earth by John Rutter, and Festival


Sanctus by John Leavitt. Especially good marks were received in interpretation, diction, and performance factors. Interpretation is the style, phrasing, tempo, dynamics, etc. of a song and diction is the clarity with which you sing a piece. Performance factors include song choice, posture, facial expressions, memorization of a piece, attire, etc.

The orchestra received a superior rating and also qualified for State; however, this year was a trip year, and we were not able to attend the State Festival due to conflicting schedules. The songs taken to region this year included Fanfare by Richard Stephan, Nettleton an American Hymn Tune, and Capriccio Espagnol by Rimsky-Korsakov/Dackow. Capriccio Espagnol included a wonderful violin solo performed by Lauren Palfreyman. We received especially good ratings in the categories of rhythm, technique, and once again performance factors.

It is always important to note that our high school's orchestra and choir would never be as good as they are without the help of our choir director and orchestra conductor, Lois Faber. We would like to thank you and applaud the hard work and effort you put into our school and the students who attend. *

This was a very successful year for the Utah Jazz as they finished the year with a 51-31 record and the 5th seed in the West. They had a very competitive series in the first round against Chris Paul and the Los Angeles Clippers. It went to game 7 where the Jazz destroyed the Clippers in LA.

Everything was going well until they had to go up against the sharpshooting Golden State Warriors, who had just swept the Portland Trail Blazers in their previous series. The Warriors were the \#l seed in the playoffs and the team is filled with current and former All-Stars including Kevin Durant, Steph Curry, Klay Thompson, and Draymond Green. This combination is a hard matchup for any team as the Warriors come in as the top scoring team of the season.

The Jazz had one of the top defenses in the league; however, the fast-tempo offense of the Warriors was too much. Steph Curry put up 22 points in three quarters of play in game 1 as the Warriors won 106-94. Things went from bad to worse for the Jazz as their starting point guard, George Hill (who's been battling injuries all throughout the year), went down with a toe injury and was out for the remainder of the series. Kevin Durant put up 25 points and 11 rebounds in game 2 where the Jazz trailed the entire game and lost 115-104.

The series went to Utah for game 3 as the Jazz were trying to avoid going down 3-0 in the series. This was their best shot at trying to avoid getting swept as they held Klay Thompson and Steph Curry to a combined 7-29 from the field. It was a relatively close game, but Kevin Durant's 38 points and 13 rebounds was the difference maker as the Warriors won 102-91. It was especially evident in the 4 th game that the Jazz didn't have any answer to the Warriors top scoring offense. Steph Curry went off for 30 points and Draymond Green picked up a triple double ( 17 points, 11 assists, and 10 rebounds) as the Warriors ended the Jazz season 121-95. This is a young Jazz team that has a lot of potential to continue to get better as long as they can keep their All-Star shooting guard, Gordon Hayward.

As for Steph Curry and the Golden State Warriors, they will continue on in the playoffs and try to win their 2nd championship in the past 3 years.
