The ACT (American College Testing) is a college admission test that high school juniors are highly advised to take. The results of the test can be used to gain scholarships or to even be accepted by some colleges as many colleges require an ACT score on your application.

This year on the 27th of February was the first year that the ACT was taken on the computer, instead of with paper booklets. The idea was that it would be more cost effective and efficient than the booklets. Although it is more supposed to be more efficient, it still takes 5 to 8 weeks to get the results from the test.

In Utah, the ACT has now replaced the SAGE test for the juniors. Unlike the SAGE, the

# UVU TRIP

On January 8th, 2018, three students took a trip to Utah Valley University in order to check out the college and see what it's like if they decide to go there. ACT is taken all in one day, instead of being spread out over several days. The ACT covers the following subjects: Math, Science, Reading, English, and Writing. Each subject has a time limit of 35 to 60 minutes. All together it adds up to about four hours of testing and staring at a computer. The lengthy amount of time caused the students and teachers to be nervous about test fatigue from looking at the computer screen for such a long period of time.

There were two breaks in the testing session, the first to allow the students to use the restrooms and get a drink of water, and the second was to eat lunch. The breaks helped to avoid extreme test fatigue. Taking the test on the computer was less paperwork for the administrator, but the possibility of network issues was frightening because the school is

One of the complaints about the test format was that in the reading test, the individual was unable to see all of the questions about the passage before reading it; instead they had to read it over for each question to be sure of their answer.

Another complaint was that you lost time while each question was loading. It could take up to three to four seconds for a question to load, which adds up if there are a lot of questions. On the positive side the students didn't have to worry about getting their answer sheet number off from the question booklet numbers like they did before. Altogether, for the first time taking the test on the computers, things went pretty smoothly. ◆

### **PHYSICS AND COMPUTER TECH FUN**

Physics is a class that few would think of as fun, yet it can be. This year, eleventh grade students participating in the Physics class taught by Teresa Conrad have done more than worksheets and quizzes. They've played with water and air propelled rockets, they've had to get an egg safely through an obstacle course, and they've constructed a windmill.

The first of these activities was the egg obstacles course which was done in the first quarter. Students had to move an egg from a desk to a countertop, through a cardboard tube, over a stack of wood blocks, into a sink, up a ramp onto a wood block, and drop the egg into a bucket on the floor without breaking the egg or touching it with their hands more than once. Megan and Dilzia's team cleared the obstacle course the fastest.

Later that quarter, the students got to go outside and experiment with air pressure and tilt to see what amounts of the two made a plastic rocket travel the farthest away from its launch pad. They also experimented with a two liter soda bottle, water, and a bike pump to see how high they could launch the bottle in the air. The students would fill the bottle with varying amounts of water, attach the bottle to the bike pump, and put as much air pressure as they could into it before the bottle launched itself into the air to see how much water would produce the highest launch.

Then in the second quarter, Teresa tasked her students with designing a windmill from scratch that could lift 30 paperclips 30 centimeters with nothing to power it but a hair dryer. All

of students succeeded, so naturally, it turned into a race. Who could lift the paperclips the fastest? Team Megan and Dilzia came in last. Team Melanie and Jami came in second. And Team Jorge and Dallas came in first with the record time being under a second.

Physics isn't the only class that the juniors have been having fun in. Computer Tech has also been an entertaining class for the juniors. Greg Faber, the teacher of computer tech, had



the juniors design and build popsicle stick bridges which, due to student promptings, were tested to see whose bridge was the strongest. Jorge and Dilzia's bridge came in last, collapsing after just two encyclopedias were placed on it. Melanie and Megan's bridge came in second,

collapsing after fifteen encyclopedias were placed on it. Dallas and Carson's bridge came in first, collapsing after twenty-two encyclopedias were placed on it.

Mr. Faber has also had his students design and print a variety of objects on the 3D printers kept in his classroom. It's been a fun year for the juniors so far. Who knows what other kinds of fun they will experience the rest of this quarter and the next? ◆

## **EVERYBODY HAS A STORY-A PROFILE ON BEN ROBERTS**



For this article, I interviewed Ben Roberts. More specifically, I asked him about the story of his time in the Peace Corps:

#### Why did you decide to join the Peace Corps?

I joined the Peace Corps because I wanted to travel, see part of the world, and maybe learn some new skills.

#### Where were you posted?

I was posted to Morocco, North Africa, where we did three months of language and

technical training in the capital of Rabat before we were sent to our final locations.

How old were you when you joined the Peace Corps?

That's a good question. I believe I was twenty-three.

What exactly did you do in the Peace Corps?

I was a biologist at Eastern High Atlas National Park, primarily studying Barbary sheep.

How long were you in the Peace Corps? I was in the Peace Corps for two years and

three months.

# • What was the most interesting part of your life in the Peace Corps?

The town that I was posted in was called Tounfite, which was a town of... I don't know 800 or 1000 people. It was the end of the pavement road. That was the last town with pavement streets.

So, to get up to the forestry post which was in the Park that I was working at, I either had to hike 16 miles, or I had to ride a Camion, which is essentially a big dump truck without a dump bed. It's just got a flat bed with tall four to five foot sides. The trucks only went up every three to four weeks. If you wanted to get a ride, you had to pay the driver. The amount depended on what you wanted to carry. Everybody who was going to all the little tiny villages of twenty people or fifty people along the way would all ride in the same Camion, along with goats and sheep.

So, in any given Camion, you'd have anywhere from ten to twenty-five people, usually four or five sheep and goats, and all the supplies that people were taking up or down with them, which included big, hundred-pound bags of oats or wheat that they'd grown and were hauling down, which they'd take to the mill. They would subsequently bring back hundred-pound bags of flour, big five-gallon drums of cooking oil, and propane bottles. That was all the people had to survive off of.

Ben lives in Baker with his wife, Brandi, his amazing son Sam, and his dog Biscuit. In his spare time, he likes to read, work on his family's house, landscape, work on his jeep, and travel. ◆
