CHROMEBOOKS COMING TO EHS /GSS

EskDale High School and Garrison Secondary Schools are receiving Chromebooks as part of an experimental program by the Millard School District, the goal of which is to provide schools with 1:1 device ratio - one device for every student! The District wants to see how effective Chromebooks can be on a classroom level, and our tiny school works as an excellent test subject. The faculty also believes this technology will help students have more success academically.

The Chromebooks will be arriving during the second week of October. We will start training and learning how to use them properly on October 6th-8th.

All of our students believe that this technology for our school will be very helpful. Melanie Heckethorn says, "I think the Chromebooks are going to help our school, because it's going to be a lot easier to do English because we type a lot during English. In Mr. Faber's class, Math, we will be able to look at math problems on the internet, and a bunch of other stuff like that." Our new school administrator Dr. Sheppard says, "It will allow the students to have more access to academic sites than we have now." We will be able to have more readily available access to academic sites on the classroom level, and it will also be easier for EHS students to get all of their work done.

There was some talk of students possibly being able to take the Chromebooks home, although Dr.Sheppard has stated that we cannot because the risk of destroying

or losing them. Another reason is because the charging stations are here at the High School, so we would not be able to charge them at our homes. We must agree that this is wise because some kids here at Eskdale High School are irresponsible and could destroy their Chromebook or lose it as Dr. Sheppard stated.

Many of the students believe that the Chromebooks will help accomplish assignments in a shorter period of time. For instance, we will be able to do our work even when all the computers are taken in the Study Hall.

We believe the Chromebooks will be a big help, and we are very excited for their arrival.
