CHRISTMAS BANQUET INTERVIEWS

Over the years EskDale High School's annual Christmas Banquet has gained a good reputation, from the four course meal, to the full-on entertainment performed by the student body of EHS. To achieve all of this, it requires a lot of help and support from the teachers, parents, and EskDale Community members. I recently interviewed some of the biggest contributors to ask them why they do what they do.

Mary Weight has been the coordinator over the parents for twenty one years. She assigns parents to either Thursday or Friday to help in the kitchen and the other night they get to see the play. When asked if she has ever attended the Banquet as a guest she replied, "No." When I asked her why she told me, "Because I am working in the kitchen." I proceeded to ask her if the other parents received a night to see their children perform and she told me, "Yes, they do." Mary Weight has three children performing in the Banquet this year. I asked her if she thought is was fair that the other parents received a night to watch the play and she laughed. "Yes, I do think it is fair because I'm not sure if I could sit peacefully through the

Banquet." Mary Weight volunteers her time, and spends 120 plus hours in prep, planning, and coordinating all the parent help. There are over thirty volunteers this year that give at a bare minimum of three hours to helping prep the food and clean up. Some parents give up to twenty hours.

EskDale Community is a very big contributor to the Banquet. They supply all of the China, silverware, glass cups, decorations, lighting, sound



systems, fuel, and the space to put it all together. If EskDale Community did not give all of this and we had to pay for everything including the parent help each plate would cost at least \$300. The student body is very grateful to EskDale Community for allowing us to put on this performance and giving us the opportunity to excel in the arts.

I also interviewed Tabitha Phillips one of the makers behind the magic of the Banquet. Tabitha is an alumnus of EskDale High School and a professional chef whose help is invaluable. I asked her why she volunteers her time since she is a professional chef and could ask to be paid; she told me, "To relieve stress of the other volunteers, I helped with the Banquet early on, and it was a very stressful situation." I asked her how many hours she puts into the Banquet and she replied, "120 plus." She has helped with the Banquet for the past five years. I asked her what is her inspiration for the food is and she bases it off of the play. This year we are having a nice meat and potato meal. Since the play is about a woman trying to get arrested, she decided to do a fancy jail-food-type dinner. Individually Tabitha is putting in over twelve hours per Banquet night. That is a lot of hours dedicated to EHS. Her help really makes the Banquet a memorable occasion for everyone who attends.

Crystal and Janene Eldridge are the main reason we all look so wonderful in the plays. They volunteer their time and have made quite a few of the costumes we use in the plays. On average it takes about eight hours to make one costume. For the Aladdin play we did last spring it took over three months to get all the costumes made. I asked if they make all the costumes by hand and Crystal responded, "Yes, between my mom and I we make the costumes. I design them and my mom sews them." I asked what her inspiration was for the costumes and she told me, "Tv, movies, and watching lots of plays. When I watch plays I notice the customs." If you ever wondered who makes most of our amazing costumes now you know.

The last major contributor I interviewed was Kenneth Conrad. He does all of the decoration for the Banquet. He has been volunteering his time for eight years. On average it takes anywhere from two to three hours to decorate depending on the complexity of the center piece. I asked him how long it takes to do all of the prep work and he said, "Forty hours, but it just depends on the complexity." The EskDale Community dining hall always looks so wonderful due to the hard work of Kenneth Conrad. Every year when I walk in to the Center, and I am always amazed at how beautiful it looks.

Putting on the Banquet is a big job, it requires a lot of man hours to put it all together. The student body of EHS could not do this without the help of all the parents, EskDale Community members, and the volunteers from around the valley. As a member of the student body I want to take a moment to say thank you for all you do without you we could never do this. **Thank you!**

CB: What are your expectations for the team this year?

KC: My first expectation is for the players to work well with the team and work with coaches to develop fundamentals. KC: It varies throughout the team. Some work hard to stay in shape. I am also really impressed with how the players are learning to work together as a team. The players also have good discipline and focus this year

CB: Do you like coaching?

KC: Yes, If only I could get players to consistently practice shooting.


