Basketball Season 2014


Like previously said Bas-

WHERE MY LIFE BEGAN

a personal essay by Tina Hayward

I have to laugh when people say, “I come from a small town. It only has like 10,000 people in it!” Small? I don’t think so. “Small” isn’t a town that has several thousand people in it, and a “small” school with a couple hundred students isn’t truly small. Where I live, there are only about seventy people (not counting Baker or the few dozen people scattered throughout the valley,) and my *entire* school, grades seven through twelve, only has twenty-six students. “Small” doesn’t even apply to EskDale. *Infinitesimal* might be more accurate. Alright, that might be a bit extreme, but EskDale is a tiny place, unique in how it has influenced and shaped my life, and my home.

Ninety miles from anywhere, EskDale is an oasis in the desert. Surrounded by its own fields of barley, hay, corn, and alfalfa, EskDale Community only has a circumference of about half a mile, omitting a few outlying buildings, such as my house, the shop, and dairy. Dozens of dirt roads criss-cross the desert behind my house, and they can be a maze sometimes. The roads make excellent long distance running trails, but you need to be careful of rattlesnakes.

I’ve run into many dead rattlesnakes that have been crushed by a passing truck, but I’ve had a couple of close calls with live ones as well. The first time I did that, I was running with my brother/running coach, Mark, past the dump after dark. Because I was wearing the head lamp, Mark had to run behind me, and he took the opportunity to push me to go faster. I didn’t even notice the snake as I ran past, but when Mark passed it moments later, I heard a loud buzzing sound. However, that was nearly drowned out by some startled yelping noises that Mark made as he danced past the angry rattler. We sprinted until we were sure that we were out of its reach and only then dared to stop. After we had caught our breath, Mark wanted to go back and look at it, and that’s exactly what we did. It was really cool, but I was glad when we left it and ran home on another road. I like snakes, but not necessarily the ones that could kill me.

Snakes aren’t the only wildlife we have around here, though. We have all sorts of animals such as antelope, deer, coyotes, rabbits, jack-rabbits, chipmunks, lizards, and lots of birds. We also have a large number of cows at our dairy. Even though I live right next to it, I don’t tend to go there much.

The dairy has and continues to employ several of our high school students, but I have never worked there. I have other jobs to help me make money. Mostly, I get paid to clean some of the buildings here on a weekly basis. I clean parts of several buildings, including the Center, which is where the whole community gets together for their daily lunch. The EskDale Public High School is allowed to use it for a few things too. For example, the school kids are welcome to bring their lunches with them to eat at the tables, and they are able to perform the annual fundraiser of the Christmas Banquet- a dinner theater show- there as well.

The people of EskDale are very supportive of the school, and many even help put on most of the fundraisers and concerts the school does every year. My mom and dad are some of those people. When we put on the Christmas Banquet, my mom always volunteers to help where she can, and my dad is the lights and sound guy for all of the productions. He lets me help him, and I love it. For the past several years, I have helped him set up the lights and sound for every production that needs them, including the Christmas Banquet.

A lot of productions and fun things happen in December, and it is one of my favorite times of the year. The Christmas Banquet has to be my favorite part of December, aside from Christmas, that is. I love the hustle and bustle beforehand, and I love to help my dad backstage. I’ve always been his gofer when he sets up, but since Mark has left for college, he has been training me to run the lighting board. I now know enough to program and run the lights myself! I really enjoy doing that, but it hardly takes up all of my time.

For the rest of the time, I enjoy practicing piano and violin (most of the time, I do,) and singing in the school choir. Because we have so few students, everyone is in choir. Plus being small allows us take the choir on expensive and distant school trips! A few years ago, we went to Washington D.C., and this year we are going to New York! Every school day, the choir meets in EskDale’s Auditorium, which also holds the rest of the music and drama classes. It is a multi-purpose building and happens to act as the church building for the local congregation on weekends.

I have lived in EskDale all my life, and I have never given a second thought to the habits and customs I have adopted from this singular little oasis. When I really think about it or talk about how it works to anyone who has never been here, though, I see how special EskDale is. We are a tight-knit group, really. Everyone is family, and all share in the hardships of living on a small farming community. Living here has really shown me how important it is to be there for people.

I am glad that I have grown up here; I wouldn’t trade it for anything. It is distinct in many ways and has its own special problems, but I love it. It is green and beautiful, and the people are great. All my older siblings have moved away either to go to college or to make their way in the world. I know that I will also leave eventually, but I know that EskDale will forever be responsible for a part of me. My whole world view has been shaped by my life here, and that’s okay. I wouldn’t have it any other way.
