during the Charleston, and Donnie let us keep it."

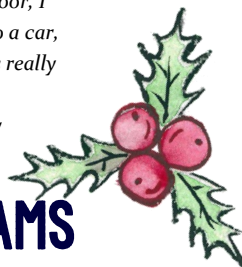
Aidan: *"They kept pulling my shoelaces and untying my shoe. It was obnoxious."*

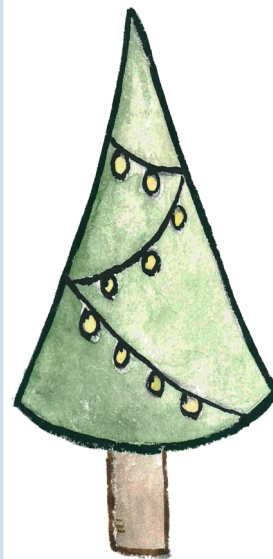

Every Friday at EskDale High School, we have an accelerated schedule for morning classes, so that we end up with an hour to use before lunch. This is filled with different lessons and activities, either as a whole school or class groups, all towards various aspects of positive behaviors, such as Digital Citizenship skills, Suicide Awareness, etc.

This year, each of the seniors has had the responsibility to lead one of the Flex Friday whole group sessions. Since our last newspaper, three more seniors have had the chance to organize their Flex Friday events—Aidan Faber, Matthew Baker, and Ernesto Avelar.

Aidan's Flex Friday was about the damaging effects of online echo chambers and thought radicalization. He discussed how there is a rising percentage of people from this generation who believe that stuff like the Holocaust didn't actually happen. Also about other questionable theories circulating online that have more of a following than they should in educated society. He also showed a small conversation he had about the 9/11 attack through the YouTube comments where a shocking display of general ignorance was observed. Aidan also got sort of a death threat through that, but there was nothing really to worry about since it was from a state miles away. He also

talked about how Neo-Nazis had been marching and walking through streets sometimes armed with weapons. It was an interesting discussion. Aidan gave everyone candy afterwards.

people. So, I hung out with Neto D.

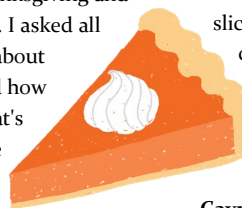
Ella: Umm I lowkey don't remember but being able to hang with everyone was fun. ♦

Stran: To get a mini Jeep

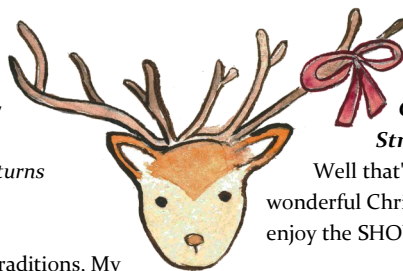
Eligh: To work out and get fit.

EVERYBODY HAS A STORY: ROBIN CROUCH

Robin Crouch. A lot of people know her for amazing cooking, her involvement in the church and in the local community. But she is also the oldest sister of eight, a mom of four, a wife, and a grandma of eleven. I had the amazing opportunity to interview her on a little bit of her life. She had some very good things to say. Here is what she had to say:

Q. What was your life like growing up?

A. "I grew up on a small off-the-grid 40-acre homestead in the western Utah desert. My parents started out in a tent, but by the time winter came, my dad had cobbled together a small 2-room cabin. Narrow wooden stairs led to a dugout basement with damp, earthen walls. I was always afraid of that dark forbidden space. The cabin was built from bits and pieces of cast-off lumber from our friends on neighboring homesteads. Our meager belongings were in cardboard boxes stored in a tent attached to the back of our house, which also doubled as a spare room occasionally. One of my earliest memories is when that tent burned with all our clothing, but Dad was able to keep the house from catching fire, with a garden hose and the neighbors' help."

Q. Can you tell an interesting life story?

A. "One year when we had chickens, a winter storm moved in before we had the chicken coop finished. All the chickens ran to the shelter of our outhouse (which had no door to stop them from entering) to the sewage pit below. When the storm was over, imagine our surprise to find the outhouse full and overflowing with chickens! Dad and Mom spent several hours with a rake lifting filthy, unhappy chickens out of the pit."

Q. What are some life stories you have learned and why?

A. "Not sure if I've learned any lessons. Mostly I just feel like I'm getting a little smart too late."
(Author's opinion: Not even a little bit true, she is way too smart!)

Q. Did you go to college, and to do what?

A. "I went to UVU for my entire college career."

Ended up with my law degree (jurisprudence doctorate)."

Q. When were you married, how did you meet?

A. "I met my husband Ron when he was 10 and I was 7. Of course, I wasn't thinking of him as marriage material then. He was just a big galoot for me to tease (laughs). We started dating after he went to college, then married after my first year of college. I was 19 and he was 22."

Q. What is something not a lot of people know about you?

A. "I don't know, I don't really like secrets. And the big secrets are for me (laughs)."

Q. What are your hobbies?

A. "I like to drive around and sight-see, read spy stories, research local history, play piano, and sit on a covered patio during a summer rainstorm. I also love visiting with my children and grandchildren. Also reminiscing with my friends who grew up with me at EskDale."

Q. What did you want to be when you were a kid?

A. "I wanted to be an author or a schoolteacher."

Q. When you look at your family now, how does it make you feel?

A. "I am very proud of my family (children and grandchildren). Even though I know it isn't something I did, I still feel pride in my heritage which runs strong in my family members. They all love the Lord and have a passion for good and seeking God's will in their walk with Him. We all share a strong family bond of love and responsibility. All have a strong moral fiber. So far, no divorce, substance addiction, or laziness. They treat others with respect and live clean lives. They seem to have the moral street to make decisions independent of peer pressure. Oh yes, I guess you could say I'm quite pleased with my family!"

Q. What is some advice you would like to give?

A. "Just because everyone is doing it, doesn't mean it's right. And just because no one is doing it, doesn't mean it's wrong."



There is almost too much to say of the way I felt after this interview. While listening I found myself intrigued with the answers, rather than waiting for it to be over. I put everything in here because it's all so fascinating and important. She has lived quite a marvelous life. Learned things, been places, and yet never seems to boast about her knowledge. I mean she said "a little smart".... The woman went to college, became a lawyer, raised four children, and has been running a business since 1992. Plus, look at the way she answered. Like a scholar, like a writer.

Some people know her from church or cooking. But I know her from the endless rides she would take us on as kids, the stories she would tell us while we would all be listening wide eyed, from sitting with us and drawing while she gave us tips and encouraged us to keep trying to be better, from the endless meals she prepared (I don't know how she didn't get tired of it), the jokes, the laughs, the love, for being there on our special days. Some people may know her, but I know her like this. I know her as grandma. ♦

What is a memorable story about your graduating class?

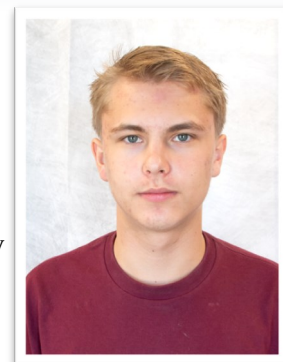
One of my birthday parties when a bird pooped on Aidan's hamburger.
