This is the Place Heritage Park

The Heritage Park was a very cool

The next tour stop in SLC was the Utah State Capitol building. The students arrived early and were able to walk around the outside of the building to see the various monuments, such as the Mormon Battalion monument and the Peace Officers' Memorial. When we finally entered the building, we were joined by our docent who was an excellent guide through the

historical features and stories of each room within. Because we visited while they were in sesson, we were able to see both sides of the Utah Leaislature in action. We visited the House assembly room and witnessed

Afterwords, we saw the Senate room and their voting process. The last place we went was technically outside the Capitol building and down below it, where we were able to see the base isolators (base isolators are beams made of lead and rubber that work

shock absorbers that can shift the building above 2 feet in any direction to avoid major earthquake damage). It was a great tour overall and very interesting. Sharon (who brings the new junior high classes here every other year) said this was the best tour guide yet.
